As cars have become more and more hi-tech we have seen a rise in keyless thefts of motor vehicles around the town. #### In summary:

- Talk to your dealer about the digital features of your car – have there been any software updates you can take advantage of? I would like to finish on a happy but also sad note. PC 'Deano' Brearley has completed
- Can your keyless fob be turned off? Check with your dealer that you can turn it off overnight
- Store your car entry fob away from household entry points such as front or back doors or windows
- Invest in a signal blocking pouch often called a 'faraday pouch'

#### YOU SAID ... WE DID

I get a number of requests to deal with individuals regarding the anti-social manner of driving in the town. Our police teams work tirelessly to deal with the individuals and several section 59 notices, Traffic Offence Reports and vehicles seizures have taken place this month. We have also seized a number of electric scooters and all of our updates are promoted via our social media pages.

Requests for more of a visible police presence within the town centre due to ASB issues. PC Christian Meen and PCSO Michael Soanes have been on patrol most days in response and their updates and pictures again can be found on our Lowestoft Police social media Pages.

We had an online request from a community group in north Lowestoft to carry out visible police patrols following an increase in ASB issues in the particular area. PC Graham Baker attended the area and carried out numerus foot patrols at the location and spoke with a number of residents who were happy to see him.

We cover a range of areas from highly populated urban areas such as Halesworth, Saxmundham and Leiston, to rural villages such as Debenham, Brundish and Sibton and everything in between totalling 128 parishes, towns and villages. Our main bases are in Halesworth, Eye and Saxmundham. We are a small team with a lot of responsibilities but we all relish the challenge.

Recently in the Halesworth sector we have seen an increase in the theft of keyless motor vehicles and rural thefts from outbuildings and businesses. We are keen to get out and engage to provide crime prevention advice so if you see us please ask. However, the Suffolk Constabulary website has a range of security advice and information via www. suffolk.police.uk/firstprinciple.



Our Rural Crime team have been very busy in recent weeks and on the 11 May 2023 they joined the Diss branch of NFU Mutual, sharing their expertise of all things rural with their members. This is a crucial engagement which helps to fortify relationships and tackle rural crime. Sqt Brian Calver is the rural crime lead and is pictured below with members of his team and the NFU.

One of our biggest areas of complaint from you is speeding and traffic offences East Ipswich. PCs Jon Stordy and Richard Fall are our resident traffic gurus and are based in the Eye Safer Neighbourhood Team base. As well as conducting speed checks in 'hot spot' areas, as reported by local residents, they are proactively looking for moving vehicle offences in a bid to keep our roads safer. Recent engagements include a large

tractor trailer attempting to emulate Lewis Hamilton's F1 slick tyres and another forgetting that you need to see the road to drive on it!

#### YOU SAID... WE DID

We have had multiple reports of ASB in Saxmundham relating to youths shouting and swearing in the street and playing 'knock and run' on vulnerable home owners. We have conducted plenty of patrols in the area along with our Neighbourhood Response Team colleagues. Using resident's CCTV and Ring doorbells we were able to identify several perpetrators and have conducted interviews. We are now working with the Youth Justice department to ensure that the youths receive the correct education and consequences for their actions.

Speeding in Hoxne – We received multiple reports of speeders in Hoxne so PC Jon Stordy and PC Orla Jewby conducted enforcement in the area, dealing with a number of drivers who did not adhere to the speed limit.

#### PC Lee Andrews-Pearce, Community Engagement Officer

The team had a great result with a drug arrested in Grove Road in Bury St Edmunds in April. Officers had reviewed intelligence reports regarding drug activity in the area. This also coincided with ASB in the location that was affecting residents. The team worked collaboratively with the housing association to review CCTV which clearly identified drug dealing from an address.

On arrest of the occupants a large quantity of class A and class B drugs were found. The housing association served a notice to quit to the occupants to hopefully give some community reassurance regarding the situation



Officers and staff have continued to support vulnerable members of the community with visits to their addresses who have been exploited by county lines drug dealers. On one such visit three people wanted on warrant were located, arrested, and remanded in custody with custodial and suspended sentences being handed out.

Following a third-party report of two vulnerable males being tricked into giving large sums of cash to an individual. Our Police Community Support Officers provided support and guidance to the pair, helping with getting new bank accounts opened, liaising with housing providers and social care to give the right support and also assisted with housing applications. A suspect was arrested and bailed with conditions.

The team have been jointly working with local retailers and West Suffolk Council to deal with repeated and persistent begging and street drinking that was causing concern to members of the public due to disorderly behaviour. Several persistent offenders have been issued with Community Protection Notices - these notices provide a list of prohibitions that must be adhered to which prevent reoffending.



Working with the Special Constabulary we have attended the Coronation concert in the Abbey Gardens, visited school and nurseries and carried out cycling events around the town.

Sadly this will be my last Constables County in both the Forest Heath area and the CEO role as I will be taking up a different position as Schools Link PC in the south of the county. I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know the communities in this area, especially the time spend in the numerous schools, and this has brought me to the decision to take a role that focuses all its time working to support our children here in Suffolk.

As I write this, we are gearing up for the start of the Coronation of Charles III and Camilla and with events planned in our main towns of Brandon, Mildenhall and Newmarket, it looks set to be well celebrated throughout our part of the county.

We continue to proactively disrupt the supply and use of drugs in our communities by building on intelligence fed in from yourselves. This enables us to have a clearer understanding of the latest individuals linked on the ground and the organised crime groups working behind them to bring drugs into Suffolk. By developing intelligence leads we can then progress to warrants to search premises and people, conduct evictions from social housing (with the support of our housing partners), remand repeat offenders, safeguard potential victims of modern slavery and cuckooing. There has been an increase of theft of items from building sites across the west of the county and a number of ride-on lawn mowers from outbuildings. We would encourage you to review your security arrangements and this can be from CCTV through to the quality of locks used to secure sheds/ gates and outbuildings. A number of information leaflets giving advice on securing your property can be found on our Suffolk Police First Principle's page, accessed via the following link: https://www. suffolk.police.uk/crime-prevention-z

We have also seen an increased number of keyless thefts of high value motor vehicles and would urge owners to store their vehicle keys in a faraday wallet/pouch when not in use. This hides the key and its coded information, which could be electronically copied to let a thief drive your car away. Also parking vehicles under or near CCTV and having motion sensor lighting, can also act as a deterrent.

The Safety Camera team have been out and about in our area with the latest figures for March showing some 600 offenders captured speeding. We have been supporting national stalking awareness week which ran from the 24th-28th April putting out several social media posts to ensure people are better informed of the signs associated with this type of repeat and unwanted behaviour. If you are the victim of this type of crime or know someone in this situation, we would urge you to report it to the police or contact the National Stalking Helpline on 0808 802 0300.



PCSO's Anne-Marie and Bill have been out and about across the patch speaking with the community about any local issues, with several comments on social media on how good it was to see Bill back in Mildenhall. Anne-Marie has been doing some sterling work supporting the children who are at risk of taking the wrong path in our area, linking in with their families and partner agencies.



Forest Heath Cadets attended the annual Suffolk Constabulary and Suffolk Fire and Rescue Cadets Parade in April, representing our area with pride. #### YOU SAID... WE DID

Whilst being out and about on foot patrol engaging in the community the need for a regular attendance on key days, like market days, has become apparent. As a result of this we have been making ourselves available on these days either with our "pop up shop" or by conducting foot patrols, to give you the opportunity to speak with officers.

Following ongoing reports of ASB in the Peterhouse Close area of Mildenhall we have worked with partner agencies and the children involved to conduct positive diversionary tactics to assist in managing those involved. This has included educating the parents of the children on their responsibilities, especially if this puts them in direct breach of tenancy agreements, if in social housing. We have seen a swift reduction of the issues following a period of focused work.

#### YOU SAID ... WE DID

You continue to tell us where perceived drug dealing is taking place from. Thanks to timely and detailed intelligence from you, officers from your local SNT team swore out another search warrant just last week and a positive drugs warrant was carried out in the Minden Road/Cavendish Way area.

Drugs, Cash (from a recently installed wall safe) and some damming evidence held on phones are all now in our safe hands and prosecution files are being readied. Our Link Officer is now working with the suspects housing provider to trigger their eviction. We already have our sights on our next "like" warrant... again, thanks to you.

Residents living close to Sudbury's Waitrose and Lorry Park area have told us of the upturn in vehicles congregating in loud, noisy groups thereat thus causing ASB. Again, Officers from your SNT have tackled this head on and over 20 registered keepers have been written to and warned as to the consequences of continuing to plague the local community thereat. Now let's be honest, some of those keepers are the parents of the young drivers who are gathering. As I type, we've not been called back but the habitual gatherers now know that the situation will be dealt with robustly.

#### LOCAL PRIORITIES

Operation Velocity – The continued active targeting, intelligence development and disruption to County Lines drug dealers trying to take over local drug supply lines. Additionally, care is taken to regularly visit vulnerable drug users to prevent criminals cuckooing their homes and such cause a negative impact on our communities.

Operation Cease – Targeted overnight rural patrols to disrupt and deter vulnerable outbuilding, shed and farm site break-ins. Both Sudbury and neighbouring policing areas have suffered nocturnal thefts of power tools, high value equipment and small plant machinery being taken and we suspect shipped overseas. Vehicular related ASB – Sudbury Lorry Park nr.

Waitrose. Proactive and preventative patrols of this and the neighbouring areas. Engagement with those responsible and robust enforcement when persistent problems occur...including Sec.59 Notices.

All current Local Policing Priorities are owned by Insp. Ben Hollands and are constantly under review.

hope everyone enjoyed the Coronation festivities. It was poor weather on the Saturday but much better on the Sunday where the Haverhill Coronation picnic was well attended and everyone was having a nice time and it was great to see so many people.

We were sad to see DC Phil Scarfe retiring after nearly 20 years with Suffolk police. He has been our prison liaison officer at HMP Highpoint and PC Adam Nightingale will be replacing DC Scarfe as the Prison Liaison Officer.

On two different occasions our Police Cadets have been out on foot patrol checking vehicles to see anyone has left items on display. They found 12 vehicles with items on display in Kedington, prompting us to advice given to the owners of the vehicles. They also patrolled the Chalkstone estate in Haverhill where they found 17 vehicles with items on display and could not believe the items people were leaving in their vehicles - so much so they have asked to do another one at a different location in the town.



All the Suffolk Cadets units got together for the cadet awards at Great Finborough School. Lewis Fox received the merit award for our unit so well done Lewis, while Tamsin Rayment and Amelia Ward received Long Service awards. Many congratulations to you all and I am sure it was a proud day for the Cadet families who also attended. All these young people do so much great work for the community and if you know someone who think they'd like to join please finds the Join Us section of our website.

I had a market stall at Clare for crime prevention advice. We choose a wet morning but luckily it dried up a bit when we arrived. I got to speak to lots of people from the area about different issues, ranging from drugs, parking and rural burglaries.



Elsewhere, I conducted an engagement event at Barclays Bank in Haverhill regarding fraud (picture above). There are so many scams abouts especially over the phone and email so I felt it was important to make people aware of some useful tips and guidance. If you are receiving unwanted calls you can speak to your phone provider or block numbers and remember, never click on links or reply to texts and never give bank details out.

Meanwhile, I also attended the Samuel Ward school career fair which was well supported by lots of different businesses and I had lots of enquiries for our cadet unit and plenty of good questions about joining the police and the different jobs we have

I popped into the new 'Community Thrive Hub' which is for people with learning or physical disabilities - an amazing local facility and will no doubt get loads of use. This is really a great place where people can do cooking, arts and crafts and games. I will be popping back to see them to give them advice on scams in the future.

I was invited to the Army cadets in Haverhill. I spoke to them about careers in the police and how to join. They loved handcuffing and they managed to get 12 cadets in the cage of the van.

We organised a Catalytic converter marking event at ATS in Haverhill. We really appreciate them giving up a mechanic for marking the vehicles. We are still experiencing theft of catalytic converters in our area. For Op Sceptre – our regular Suffolk wide contribution to a national campaign to address knife - I attended Castle Manor Academy in Haverhill for knife crime assemblies. We have delivered leaflets around villages and the town and will be speaking to shops that sell knifes.



#### **FELIXSTOWE & WOODBRIDGE**

With two bank holiday weekends in quick succession and the King's Coronation the towns have been buzzing with activity. The Kestrel team have been patrolling the area of Felixstowe town centre and seafront where they engaged with tourists and locals at the funfair. Regular foot patrols have been taking place in Felixstowe and the seafront due to reported anti-social behaviour during the evenings and at the weekends. Our foot patrols provide reassurance and gives the public the opportunity to speak to an officer face to face. Woodbridge Safter Neighbourhood Team officers have been working with businesses and other agencies to prevent the anti-social use of motor vehicles. Officers have been providing an increased police presence in order to create an intelligence picture to identify those responsible, understand the types of ASB taking place and recording vehicle registration numbers.



There is a rise in keyless vehicle theft nationally. One unsuspecting criminal did not bargain on the police being hot on their tail in Felixstowe recently when overnight a van was stolen from a residential street. Within a matter of hours the vehicle and its contents were recovered and the suspect was arrested. Anyone with keyless technology in their vehicle will need to be aware of how they can prevent this from happening. When at home store your car keys as far away from your vehicle as possible or purchase a faraday pouch/box to prevent thieves from being able to use a device to transmit a signal to your key fob to gain entry to your vehicle. You can reprogramme your keys if you buy a second hand vehicle and you can

turn off wireless signals on your fob when it is not being used with information from the manufacturer or vehicle manual. Use a steering wheel lock or an additional alarm system as a deterrent. Up your game with a review of your general crime prevention at home and consider CCTV, motion detectors and security lighting.

A large part of my role as Community Engagement Officer is to provide crime prevention advice with the aid of our First Principle A-Z of crime prevention information which can be accessed via the Suffolk police website. The topic of fraud is often discussed at crime prevention events. There are different types of frauds whereby a person is deceived to secure an unfair or unlawful gain. There are a number of ways that you can protect yourself and loved ones from fraud and cybercrime. Do not give your personal Information to anyone or organisations before verifying their credentials. Make sure that your computer had up to date anti-virus software and a firewall installed. Ensure that your browser is set to the highest level of security and monitoring to prevent malware issues and computer crimes. Many frauds start with a phishing email, so remember that banks will not send you an email to click on a link to confirm your details. You can always phone your bank from genuine correspondence. Be sure to shred any paperwork containing your personal details at home before disposal. Be extremely wary of post, phone calls or emails offering you business deals out of the blue. If an offer seems too good to be true, it probably is. If you discover that you have been a victim of fraud, be aware of recovery fraud where fraudsters pretend to help you recover your money. Some lovely CEO colleagues from across the County joined us as we welcomed hundreds of primary school students to our rather windy engagement stall up at Trinity Park. On Saturday 29th June, I was invited to join the Rushmere community for their Coronation Celebrations, centred around St Andrew's Church. It was a lovely event and definitely one to remember – I've never set up stall in a churchyard before!



I've been busy with evening visits to some of our local youth organisations such as Brownies, Rainbows and Beavers, and a few groups have also come to visit us at the Police Museum for different evening experience. Op Sceptre took place in May, so as part of this, we did our twice-yearly empty of the knife amnesty bins.
