Cyberhood Watch: Public wi-fi and fake hotspots



Research from 16,000 households across the UK suggests Brits connect to unprotected public Wi-Fi networks for convenience - despite feeling insecure and exposed

A new survey with 16,000 households in the UK has found that six in ten Brits regularly use public Wi-Fi, with over a quarter (28%) connecting to these unprotected networks despite feeling insecure and exposed and a further 23% willingly ignoring the risks in favour of convenience. The research, carried out as part of Cyberhood Watch, an initiative created by Neighbourhood Watch in partnership with Avast, a global leader in digital security and privacy, aimed to assess the current level of apathy among consumers when using public Wi-Fi and the risk of data loss this summer as cybercriminals look to exploit the regained sense of freedom among the British public as Covid-19 restrictions end. If you plan to buy a puppy or kitten:

- · use the puppy contract or the kitten checklist
- read the RSPCA and Animal Welfare Foundation information
- always see the puppy or kitten with its mother and any litter, and if possible, in the location it was born
- never buy a puppy or kitten younger than 8 weeks old

High tech equipment used by Framers is a target for criminals

A technology arms war is escalating as high-tech thieves attempt to steal expensive equipment from farmers. Criminals are also embracing new technology. They are increasingly using <u>e-scooters and e-bikes</u> as they are faster than ordinary bikes and quieter than cars to scope out potential farms as targets.

They also conduct their search for machinery to steal by trawling <u>social media</u> and online publications. It is also increasingly common for criminals to use <u>signal jammers</u> to stop trackers working as thieves escape with a stolen quad bike.

Criminal gangs exploit our local wildlife, environment and communities. Your voice can make a difference.

Security: National Shred Day Saturday October 2nd



The British Security Industry Association (BSIA) has announced it will be hosting its inaugural National Shred Day in partnership with Crimestoppers.

National Shred Day, which will be held at multiple locations across the United Kingdom on Saturday, October 2nd, is an opportunity for small businesses and **members of the public** to safely dispose their confidential waste for a nominal donation. The BSIA's Information Destructions members will be providing their disposal units at regional sites which will be advertised locally over the summer and will be based in the car parks of large commercial parks in regions stretching from the West Country to Scotland.

All donations given on the day go towards the regional projects carried out by Crimestoppers.

The confidential waste that is collected on the day will be processed using closed loop recycling which will then be given to the NHS to be used in the provision of safety equipment.

The objectives are

- Increase awareness of identity theft
- Provision of a safe and secure way to destroy personal/business/protected documents
- Build confidence in Crimestoppers anonymous service
- Build strong partnership between the BSIA and Crimestoppers
- Provide a 'feel good' national activity

Action Fraud: Vaccine Passport Scams

Action Fraud has received over 700 reports from members of the public about fake emails purporting to be from the NHS.

The emails claim to be able to provide people with a "digital passport" that "proves you have been vaccinated against COVID-19". These emails are fake, and the links within them lead to genuine-looking websites that steal your personal and financial information.

How to protect yourself:

In the UK, coronavirus vaccines will only be available via the National Health Services of England, Northern Ireland, Wales and Scotland. You can be contacted by the NHS, your employer, a GP surgery or pharmacy local to you, to receive your vaccine. Remember, **the vaccine is free of charge**. At no point will you be asked to pay.

- The NHS will never ask you for your bank account or card details.
- The NHS will never ask you for your PIN or banking passwords.
- The NHS will never arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccine.
- The NHS will never ask you to prove your identity by sending copies of personal documents such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips.
- Your vaccination status can be obtained for free through the official NHS app, NHS website, or by calling the NHS on 119.
